

LONDON & NORTH EASTERN RAILWAY BUFFET CAR NO 9135

The LNER pioneered quick snack catering services to attract passengers from road coach competitors in the 1930s. Buffets proved popular with passengers and have come to dominate catering on today's railway.

On-board catering was not provided on the Flying Scotsman until 1900. Before this date, passengers had to be content with a 30 minute lunch stop in York.

Between 1862 and 1923 three railway companies jointly operated the Flying Scotsman: the Great Northern Railway, the North Eastern Railway and the North British Railway. This table display reflects the range of tableware produced by these companies over a 60 year period.


A closer look

The letters ECJS: Some of the tableware carries the initials ECJS which stand for East Coast Joint Stock.

OVERVIEW:

"York Map" explores York's railroad history through an interactive navigation of historical sites.

"Journey" allows the user to experience York's railway history with a national perspective, using social media.

"Account" allows the user to edit their account info and change privacy settings.

HOME PAGE



YORK MAP

York Map is an interactive map that displays the locations of 13 sites important to York's Railway Heritage.

FEATURES:



Each site is marked by a symbol, which the user can click to reveal the name, address, and brief description.



Upon arriving at the site, the user can scan a QR Code to reveal more information about the site that reveals the story of people important to the York Railway Heritage.

User's location is visualized on the map to help with navigation

Links to the user's map app to help provide further assistance

JOURNEY THROUGH YORK

UNLOCKING THE SITE:

History:

A history page will introduce the site.

Character:

Then, a character associated with each site will be introduced with audio and visual effects.

Picstitch/check in:

The user can take a picture at this location and the app will collage the personal photo with historical photographs of that site in its past state. As the person's photo is uploaded to the app, they will be checked in to that location.

Trivia:

Finally, a fun trivia question will pop up with audio clips.

Summary:


The Old Station, also known as Hudson's Station, was first built in 1840. The station acquired its title "The Royal Station" after Queen Victoria stopped for lunch at the station on her way to Balmoral Castle. The station was only active for a little over a century. It was demolished in 1966 due to the growing railway industry and the demand for a larger station.



JOURNEY THROUGH YORK



A virtual screen located at the National Railway Museum displays "Trackers" who have checked in at all the sites.

Trackers look for their picture amongst the other trackers on the virtual board or search the database for a quick find.

The illuminated photos on the board will have a pulsing visual effect to indicate that users can touch the photos, which will open up the **tracker profile**.

RAILWAY MUSEUM BOARD





FEATURES:

Users can take pictures while at train stations or on trains.

The app will organize photos by geolocations and coordinates to visually organize them along train routes.

Photos are collected on the member's online account.

Crowdsourcing capabilities allow user to view other users' photo journeys.

TRACK YOUR JOURNEY



HOW IT FUNCTIONS:

Map will appear blank intially.

Overtime photos can be taken along the route, which will appear as small squares on the map.

Users can click the small squares to expand.

Upon expanding, the location name or coordinates will appear.

Clicking the location name or coordinates will show photos taken by other users at the site.
