WAYFINDING SYSTEM FOR THE DAVIS TRAIN STATION

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Davisville Bicycle Station communicates movement and stillness by drawing inspiration from two main vehicles of transportation that relate to the city's foundation: the steam train and the bicycle.

Lines, blurred imagery, and track-like signage systems are informed by themes of movement, while focused imagery, material, and placement dictate stillness. Combining the two themes allows the audience to understand that motion can be safely slowed by a simple bike lock.



SITE EVALUATION/EXISTING CONDITIONS:

The Davis train station has various opportunities to activate the space while travelers wait for their train to arrive. As visitors enter the space, they are greeted with a large concrete island filled with palm trees and bike racks placed in close proximity to the train's main point of arrival. Activating this space was a prime consideration, as there is opportunity to engage, educate, and positively impact waiting passengers.

Commutes four times a week and works from one once a week




Albert: 58 years old







HISTORY OF STATION , GHOST LINES


Initial sketches consider various forms relating to transportation as the structural foundation. Broken and solid road lines, hollow frames, corner intersections, train tracks, and lines implying motion were all considered before deciding on a final direction.










SIGN LOCATION PLAN:

Images of stillness and motion blur were used as inspiration for textural elements used throughout this signage system. Traditional signage posts were considered, as well as traditional typography associated with railroads. Interactivity was explored with the concept of the doctor's office moveable toy, replacing the circular blocks with letters spelling out "Davis". All ideas were necessary to consider before moving forward with the final iteration.

Celebratory Sign: This interactive sign allows for users to push the "D", "V", and "S" back and forth on a track, as well as the "A" and "I" on the back track. Davis visitors and locals can climb the base and walk through the sign as well as pose in front for a great picture. This sign is intended to welcome people to Davis and pay respects to the railroad that built this town.


Interpretive / Recognition Sign: The "How The Train Made Davis" sign is an interactive and informative sign to share the histroy of the train station and the city of Davis.






