

Also at first glance, the group found it difficult to find the numbers of the domes as it did not amend its numerical order and the door numbers were hard to catch people's attention.










Here you can see that the inspiration came from the natural forms and colors you would find in nature. The text was chosen from festival posters and signs from the 70s.






