Who was he?

Simon Buckton was a merchant Taylor in the 16th century during the English Civil War and the bubonic plague. He became very successful and was able to fund the stain glass window in the Small Hall of London Company of Merchant Taylor.

History

Buckton lived through a period of social and political turmoil in York which intersected with his work at the merchant taylors hall.

His decision to become a taylor was courageous at the time due to the presence of the bubonic plague in York. Because the plague could be spread through fabric, taylor's work was very dangerous and many members of the merchant taylors fell victim.

Additionally alongside serving in the English Civil War in defense of York against the Royalists, Buckton sewed uniforms for the soldiers, making sure they were upheld to the craftsmanship standards of the merchant taylors.

Spotting Simon

Here are some of the areas where Simon once stood!

- St Michael Le Belfry, York
- Where Simon married Ann Catalan (November 8th, 1621)

- Where Simon lived during his time in the Militia (August 29th, 1648)

Political

Simon Buckton lived during significant political and social unrest, including the English Civil War (1642-1651) and the Great Plague of 1665. As a strong Monarchist, he supported King Charles I during the intense fighting of the Siege of York in 1644, but later switched his support to the Parliamentarians as they provided greater opportunity and power for the Middle Class. The Great Plague severely impacted York, causing a high death toll, labor shortages, and social strain.

Social

As a wealthy merchant tailor, Buckton would have been part of York's elite mercantile class holding local political power. Merchant taylors were among the most prominent guilds, involved in trade, craftsmanship, and civic responsibilities.

His involvement in the York militia indicates his active participation in the defense of York, aligning him with other Parliamentarians supporters who took up arms against Royalist uprisings.
