






To this day, 24% of young homeless people aged 16-25 identify as being LGBTQ+, emphasising the crucial need for our services.

With LGBTQ+ hate crimes currently on the rise \mathbf{C}' in the UK, LGBTQ+ young people are at risk of experiencing homophobic and transphobic abuse in their homes. This leaves them with an increased chance of facing homelessness.









Between April 2023- May 2024:



- Enhance the park and it's elements to provide a safe space for people that visit


































This person is interested by the exhibit and watches people spin it and decides to walk in the garden.


They choose to walk the Rainbow Way, dedicated to telling statistics of feelings of queer homeless youth.

The string lights represent the queer homeless youth that feel unsafe or without a safe space and blink to say "I'm here"

They now approach the central exhibit piece after learning more about queer homeless youth in Manchester. By turning the pole, personal stories flow down for further inspection.

Once at eye level, they are encouraged to learn about personal stories of queer youth that AKT has helped.

After interacting with the central piece, they turn around to discover there are two more paths to walk down.












Petal Path











We hope to make the garden a safe space for underrepresented communities while raising awareness around homeless queer youth.

Preface: Our addition to the Sackville Garden will educate the park goers about LGBTQ+ youth that have dealt with homelessness in England. By focusing on the goals and using information collected by the Albert Kennedy Trust, we have developed an interesting and exciting exhibition to the garden. We are focusing on the idea of home and creating a safe space for visitors upon entering the park. We plan to incorporate the three pathways in the park as different themed paths that all intertwine in the center of the park with a canopy that resembles the roof of a house, which includes a central pole and hanging boards along the inside of the canopy that have statistics about homeless LGBTQ youth. The three pathways are rainbow way, the yellow brick road, and petal path. Rainbow way starts with a gray colored walkway that transitions into a colorful rainbow path. There will be signs with case studies that are hung from string lights along the path. The yellow brick road begins with a door that opens onto a golden brick pathway lined with floating lampshades and benches with throw pillows. Finally, petal path will feature sunflowers, lilies, lavender, and poppies to symbolize different parts of life.
