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Project Overview

Whimsical, Natural, Fantasy, Organic

Enchanted Grove takes on the challenge of designing an engaging and whimsical signage and wayfinding system for the experimental and peaceful community of Village Homes in Davis, CA. This sign system includes fantastical and eclectic elements that tie into both the community and the community’s associations with the Tolkein Novels and Lord of the Rings.



Phase 1

Design Research

Look Book: Part One

Current signage in Village Homes, looking at typography and materials being used.



Signage is constructed of natural materials that are meant to weather and change over time the way communities do. Hand carved lettering emphasizes the DIY element of Village Homes.



More wood with simple plexiglass to showcase bulletin notices and general community announcements, stays true to simplicity and “community first” ethos of Village Homes.



Ringbearer font is used for title on this sign here, a font that is known for its primary usage in Lord of the Rings. The community is greatly inspired by Tolkien’s universe within the Hobbit and LOTR. This mixed with a bold serif communicates information effectively without compromising the inspiration and whimsy behind the community.

The Curious Kid

Age: 7-10

The Childminder

Age 25-75
Occupation: varies
Adults in the community and surrounding area want to find safe outdoor activities they can do with the kids in their life. Village homes provides safe walking and biking paths, and playground spaces.



The Dog Walker

Age : 20+
Occupation: Varies
Local adults looking for somewhere to walk while out with their dog. The pathways through Village Homes could be used as part of a loop on their daily walk and or either of the greens could be used for a game of fetch.



The Visitor

Age: All ages
Out of town people visiting Davis/Village homes residents. They want to explore the pathways and discover the unique attributes of the Village Homes community.

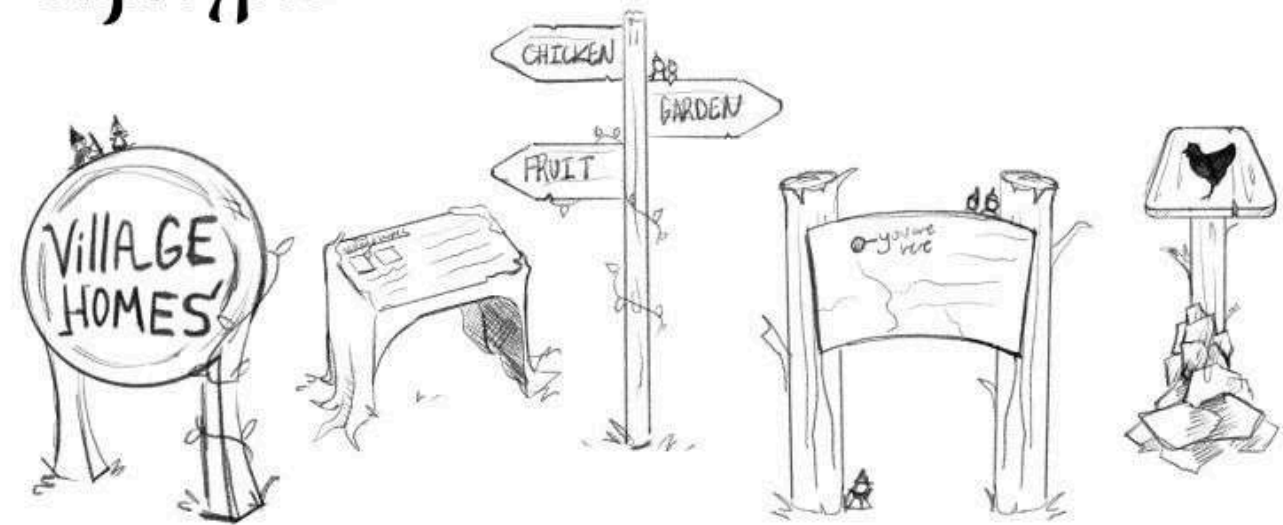

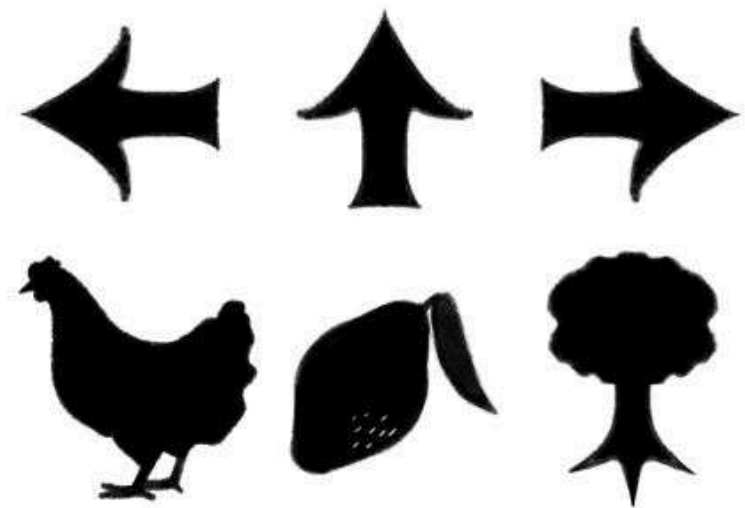

Design Palettes: Color & Typography

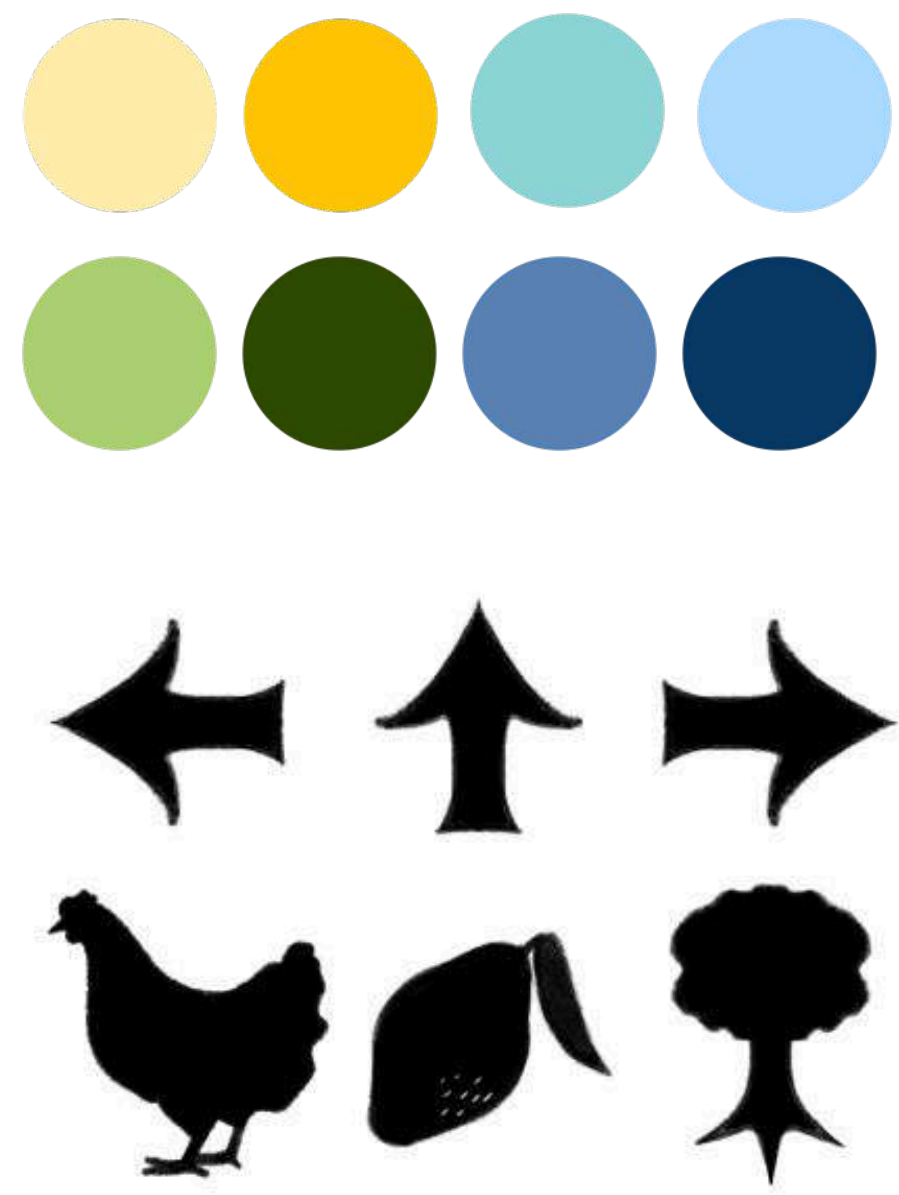

Design Palette: Engineering

This page introduces ideas of sign engineering with materials included.

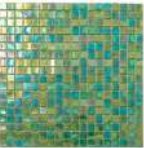


steel reinforced insides to hold the organic shapes.

Concrete base to reinforce and stabilize weight of signage into the ground without eyesore (would go underground out of sight).



Frosted glass orb that would house light fixtures.



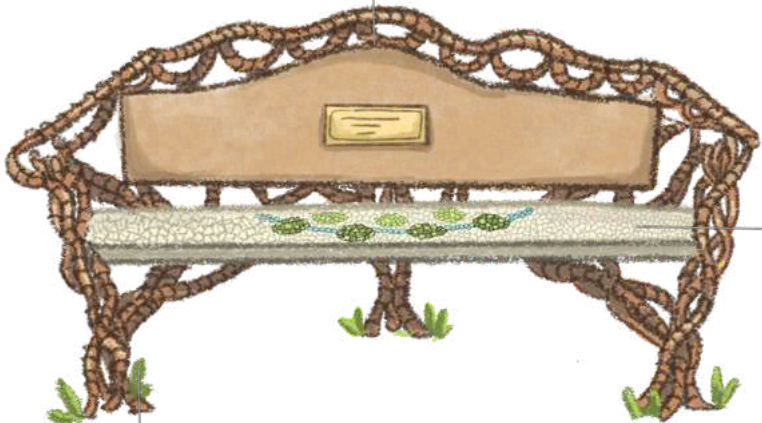
Plasma or laser-cut 10–14ga steel leaf/vine shapes, welded to trunk. Inlaid with intricate tiling in different greens to emphasize the sheen of leaves within the space.



Spindly rebar twisted to immitate wood that creates the frame of the bench, with metal like iron to further enforce backing to be leaned on by visitors.



The insides of the bench are reinforced with steel bars to hold weight and keep it sturdy.

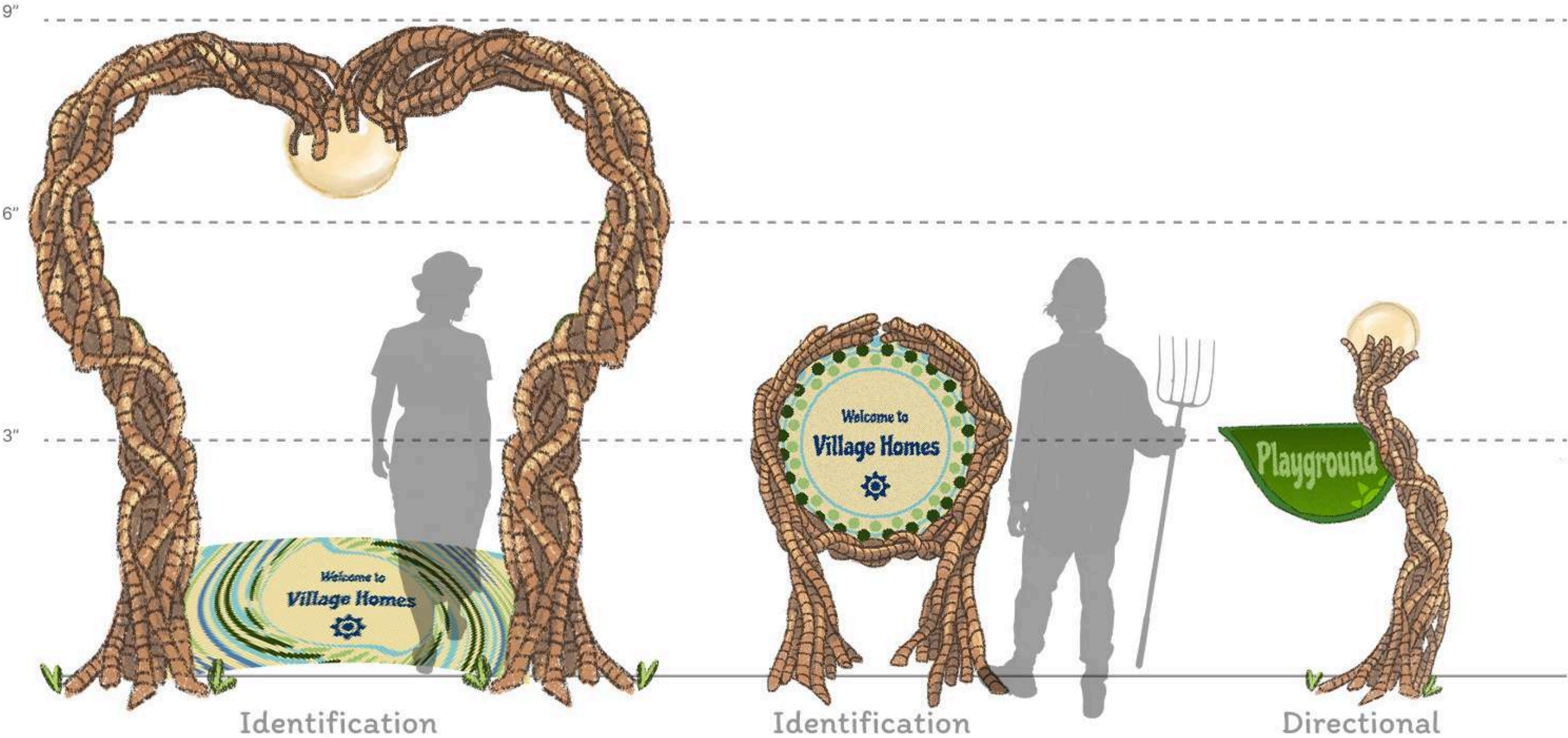


Glass or ceramic tile set into welded steel angle frame. Epoxy grout, flush surface. Interpretive or decorative motif like leaves and vines within the mosaic.



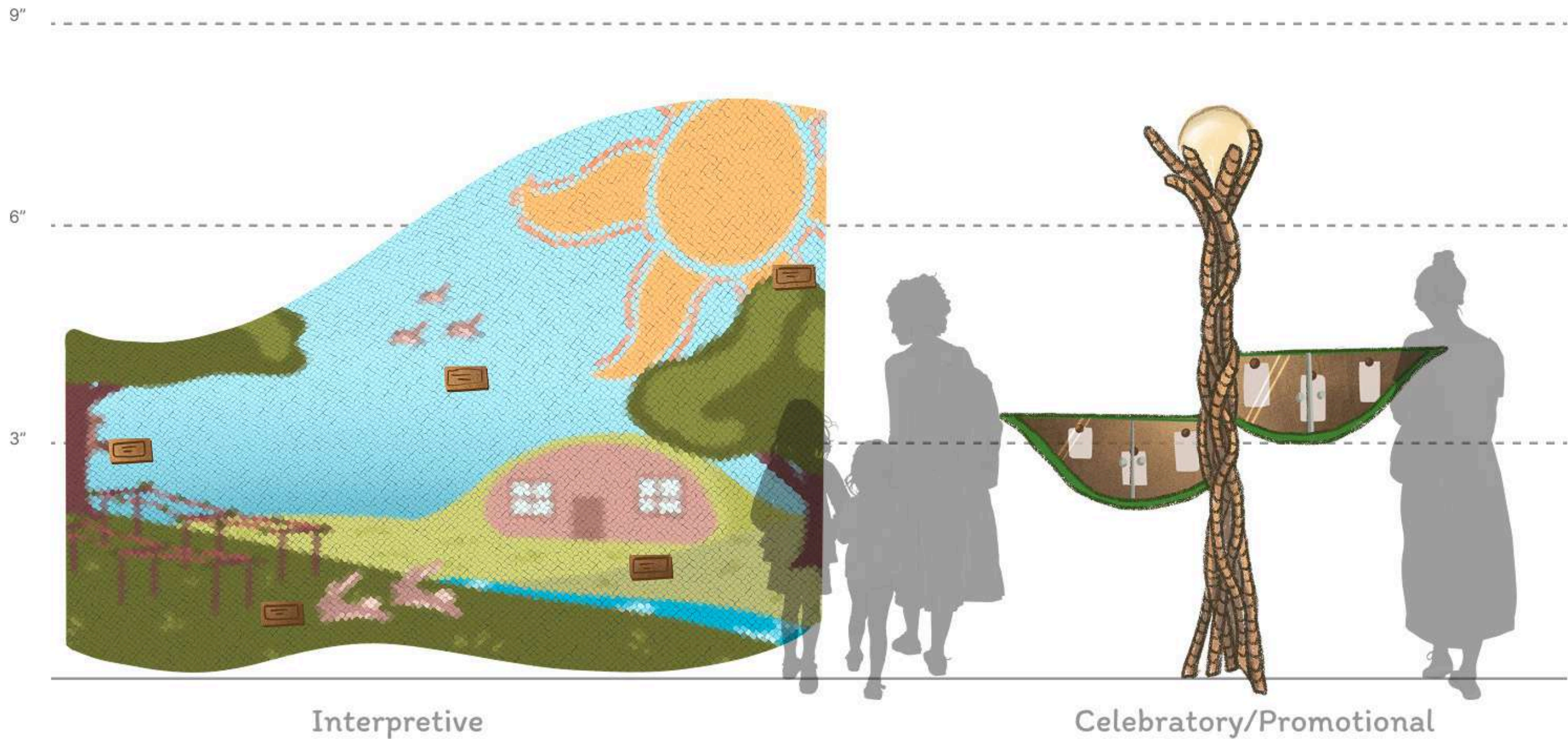
Vocabulary of Sign Types

This page shows a more detailed rendering of the identification signs and the directional sign. The first identification sign would be located at the most traveled entrance of Village homes and acts as a grander entrance. The second sign would be located at alternative entrances so that people who are traveling to Village homes can easily identify when they have entered the site but on a smaller scale than the first. Lastly, the directional sign helps visitors know when they come across any landmarks during their journey by using the leaf shape of the sign as an arrow pointing towards it.



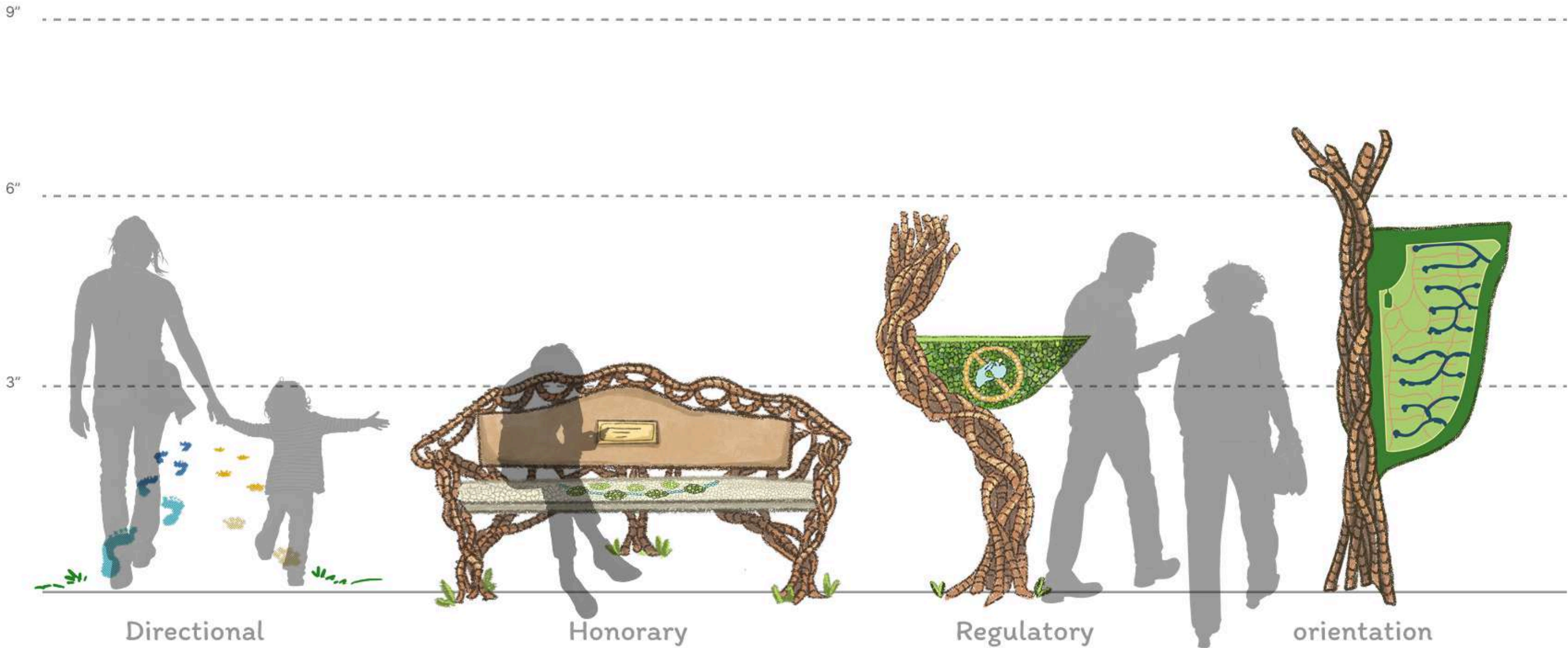
Vocabulary of Sign Types

This page shows more detailed renderings of the interpretive sign and the celebratory/promotional sign. The interpretive sign, rather than being a word-for-word story of Village Homes, acts as an art installation that features many prominent aspects related to the community with explanations included on small bronze tags strewn throughout the mosaic. The celebratory/promotional sign offers a place for community members to tack up flyers or posters to share events with other residents. Rather than using a cork board for pinning flyers, the sign features a magnetic surface to reduce any damage and increase the longevity of the sign.



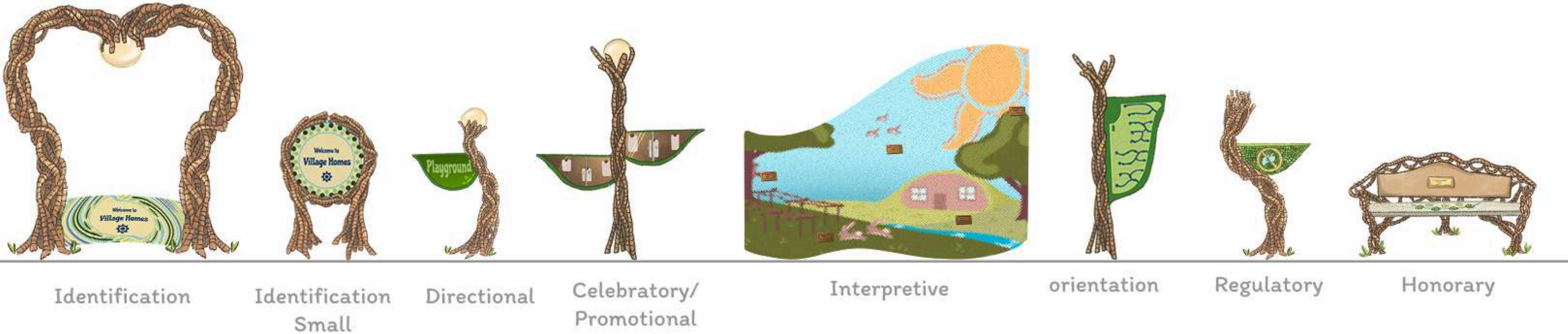
Vocabulary of Sign Types

This page shows some more detailed renderings of the secondary directional, honorary, regulatory, and orientation signs. The secondary directional signs will be mosaic footprints on the walkways that will loosely guide visitors around the site, but still give them the option to wander to locations rather than be directed. The honorary sign acts as both a place for visitors to sit, as well as a spot that honors the founders of Village Homes, Michael and Judy Corbett through a mosaic seat as well as a bronze plaque on the back of the bench. The regulatory signs act as a peaceful reminder to visitors to respect the wishes of the community while they travel through. Lastly, The orientation Sign is a map of the entirety of Village homes that would be available for visistors to look at immediately upon entry to the site.

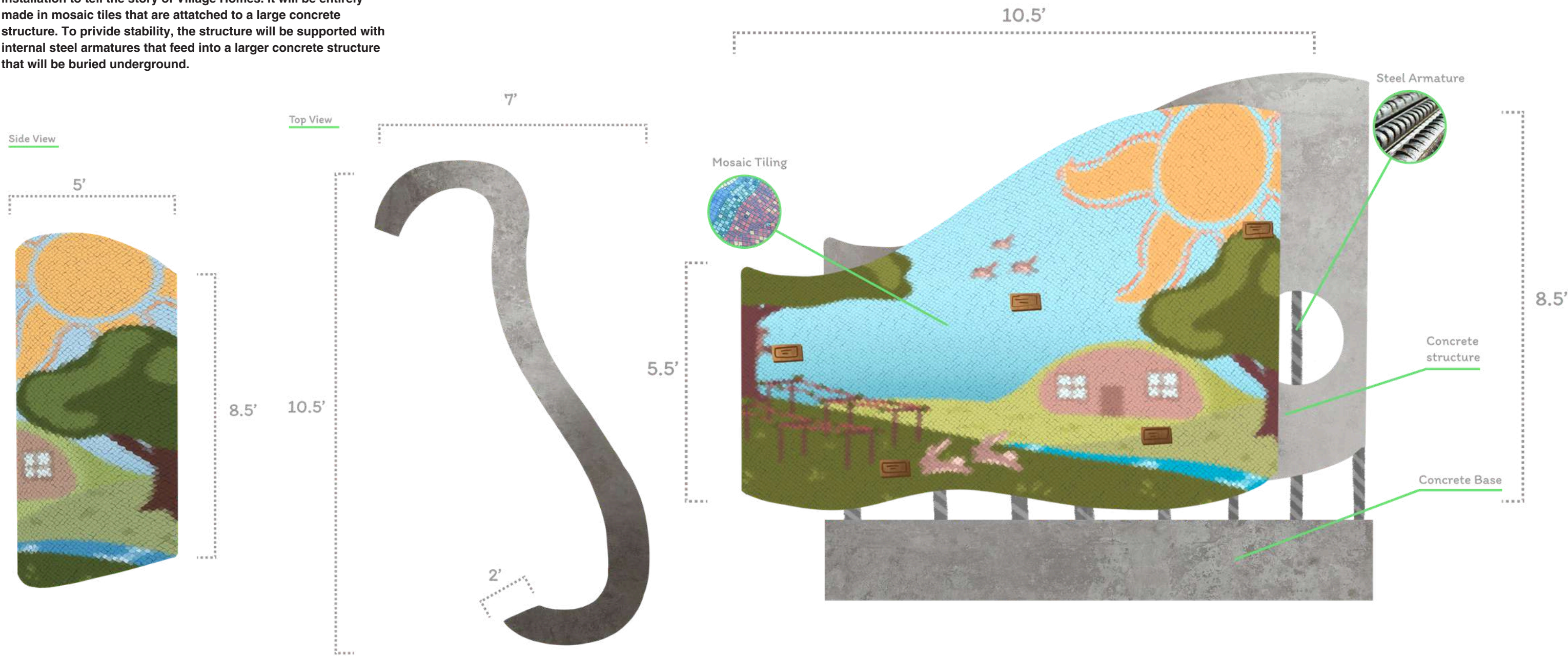
This page shows all 7 sign types in a flat view to show the scale of each of them in relation to one another.

Detailed Specifications: Large Sign

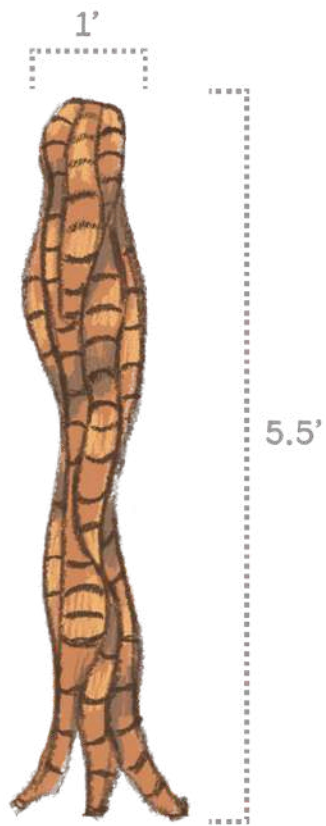
The sign depicted is the Interpretive sign that will act as an art installation to tell the story of Village Homes. It will be entirely made in mosaic tiles that are attached to a large concrete structure. To provide stability, the structure will be supported with internal steel armatures that feed into a larger concrete structure that will be buried underground.



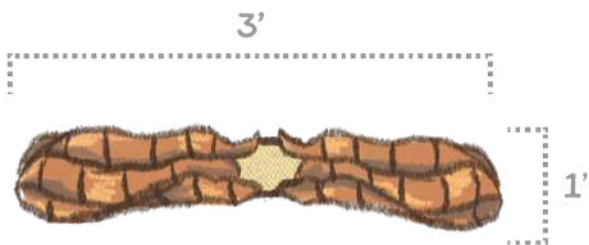
Detailed Specifications: Small Sign

The sign depicted is the secondary Identification sign. It features the same mosaic tiling that can be seen throughout the different sign types. It also features the intricate rebar detailing that twists around to mimic the look of a whimsical tree. the backing of the mosaic on this sign is a piece of metal that the tiles would be mounted on to.
